Dr. Walters called the meeting to order at 1:32 p.m.

### **Welcome and Approval of Minutes**

Dr. Walters welcomed everyone and asked for everyone present to review the meeting minutes from the January 16 2025, Education Committee Meeting. Dr. Walters asked for a motion to approve the minutes. The motion was called by Dr. Becerra and seconded by Mr. Venkatachalam. A vote was taken by verbal affirmation which passed unanimously without objection.

## **Education Team and Inspiration Index**

Ms. Purdum provided a review of the Inspiration Index:

- April and May remained very busy.
- The conclusion of the school year included a high volume of on-site demonstrations and field trips.

- On-site student visits have continued to rebound strongly, with nearly 18,000 students visiting in April and May, compared to approximately 14,000 during the same period last year.
- Spring programming included several successful events such as "Minds of All Kinds," ongoing laser shows, the Earth Day Festival, campouts, and a stained glass workshop for seniors.
- A notable event was the Sunrise Science program featuring a LEGO Masters participant who built a detailed scale model of the Science Museum using over 33,000 LEGO bricks.
- The "Science Within Reach" initiative has expanded, with senior-focused programs such as "Senior Makings" hosted in the Forge, proving particularly popular.
- Outreach efforts continue at a high pace, supported by dedicated corporate volunteers who assisted with major tasks such as relocating historic bricks from the train station.
- The Museum welcomed its second cohort of teen leaders and launched its summer programs, welcoming both volunteers and interns.
- Among the summer team is an intern from the Partnership for the Future program, highlighting continued collaboration with youth development organizations.

# <u>Museum Collection Accession requests</u>

Dr. Rose Basom introduced the collections accession requests, noting that the Education Committee will review the accession process.

- A discussion was held regarding the formal accession of three items into the museum's collection.
- Although the Museum is not a traditional collecting institution, exceptions can be made for items with direct relevance to its history.
- The Museum maintains two types of collections: educational and permanent collections, with the latter containing items of historic value.
- Formal acknowledgment is required for the inclusion or denial of the three proposed items.
- The first item is the RF & P Dispatcher's Train Manifest, shared by Richard Beetles.
- It had been on long-term loan, and repairs were completed in 2005.
- The second item is a Water Drum created by an artist from the Nottoway Indian Tribe for display in the Danville Science Center's Water exhibition.

- The previous drum was on loan and returned to the Department of Historic Resources.
- The new drum was constructed from locally sourced wood and used in PowWows and other social events.
- The third item is a Western Union Stock Ticker, intended for the Speed exhibit's Trading Speed case.
- It explores the evolution of stock market transactions.
- This item was offered as an accessioned alternative to a similar object previously on loan from the Smithsonian.

Dr. Walters invited questions or discussion. With full agreement to proceed, a motion was called by Dr. Bradford and seconded by Ms. Norwood-Marquez. A verbal vote was conducted, and the motion was unanimously approved with no opposition.
